- 1896—"The same work that has been done in the past, will be carried forward under the guise of the General Conference Association. The sacred character of this Association is fast disappearing. What will then be respected as pure, holy, and undefiled? Will there be any voice that God's people can regard as a voice they can respect? - 1896—"Who can now feel sure that they are safe in respecting the voice of the General Conference Association? - 1896—"The proclamation of the first, second, and third angel's messages has been located by the Word of Inspiration. Not a peg or pin is to be removed... - 1898—"In the General Conference the counsels of God have been set aside,.. and He is displeased. The General Conference--what is it? what does it comprehend?.. My spirit was pained within me, for I had lost confidence in that which I had ever presented before the people as the voice of God to His children. It has not been the voice of God... We cannot therefore present before the people that the voice of the General Conference in its decisions must move and control them; for its propositions and decisions cannot be accepted." 1898 17MR p. 221
- 1899—"The first, second, and third angels' messages are to be repeated. The call is to be given to the church: "Babylon the great is

fallen, is fallen, and is become the habitation of devils... Come out of her, my people, that ye be not partakers of her sins, and that ye receive not of her plagues. For her sins have reached unto heaven, and God hath remembered her iniquities. Many who went forth to meet the Bridegroom under the messages of the first and second angels, refused the third, the last testing message to be given to the world, and a similar position will be taken when the last call is made." RH, October 31, 1899

- 1900— "The third angel's message must do its work of separating from the churches a people who will take their stand on the platform of eternal truth." GCB, January 1, 1900
- 1901—"Yet we hear that the voice of the conference is the voice of God. Every time I have heard this, I have thought that it was almost blasphemy. The voice of the conference ought to be the voice of God, but it is not." 2SAT p.159
- 1901—Tenth General Conference President— A. G. Daniells 1901 to 1922
- 1901— "That these men should stand in a sacred place, to be as the voice of God to the people, as we once believed the General Conference to be,--that is past." General Conference Bulletin, April 3, 1901 par. 25
- 1901—"When the Saviour saw in the Jewish people a nation divorced from God, He saw

also a professed Christian Church united to the world and the papacy. And as He stood upon Olivet, weeping over Jerusalem till the sun sank behind the western hills, so He is weeping over and pleading with sinners in these last moments of time. Soon He will say to the angels who are holding the four winds, "Let the plagues loose; let darkness," destruction, and death come upon the transgressors of my law." Will He be obliged to say to those who have had great light and knowledge, as He said to the Jews, "If thou hadst known, even thou at least in this thy day, the things which be long unto thy peace! but now they are hid from thine eves"?" - 1902—"I will come unto thee quickly, and will <u>remove thy candlestick</u> out of his place, except thou repent. I am instructed to say that these words are applicable to Seventhday Adventist churches in their present condition....there will soon be such a lack of godliness that the Church will be represented by the barren fig tree. RH, Feb, 25, 1902
- 1902— "My brethren, I feel great sorrow of heart. I shall not appear before you again in our general gatherings unless I am impressed by the Spirit of God that I should... If that meeting did not convince you that God is working by His Spirit through His humble

servant, it is because the candlestick has been removed out of its place. I thought that after the last General Conference (34th GC 1901 Held in Battle Creek, Michigan) there would be a change of heart, but during that meeting the work was not done that ought to have been done that God might come in, nor has this work been done since that time." 18MR p.196

- 1903—"The message to the church of the Laodiceans applies especially to the people of God today. It is a message to professing Christians who have become so much like the world that no difference can be seen." RH, August 20, 1903
- 1903—"How is the faithful city (Church) become an <u>harlot</u>!" My Father's house is made a house of merchandise, a place whence the divine presence and glory <u>have departed</u>! 8T 250
- 1904— "The experience of the past will be repeated... Errors will be presented in a pleasing and flattering manner. False theories, clothed with garments of light, will be presented to God's people... minds will be hypnotized. Corruptions of every type, similar to those existing among the antediluvians... the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine... and they shall turn away their ears from the truth." RH, March 3, 1904

1904—"The enemy of souls has sought to bring in the supposition that a great reformation was to take place among Seventh-day Adventists, and that this reformation would consist in giving up the doctrines which stand as the pillars of our faith, and engaging in a process of reorganization. Were this reformation to take place, what would result? The principles of truth that God in His wisdom has given to the remnant church, would be discarded. Our religion would be changed. The fundamental principles that have sustained the work for the last fifty years would be accounted as error. A new organization would be established. Books of a new order would be written. A system of intellectual philosophy would be introduced. The founders of this system would go into the cities, and do a wonderful work. The Sabbath, of course, would be lightly regarded, as also the God who created it. Nothing would be allowed to stand in the way of the new movement. The leaders would teach that virtue is better than vice, but God being removed, they would place their dependence on human power, which, without God, is worthless. Their foundation would be built on the sand, and storm and tempest would sweep away the *structure.* "SpTB02 pp. 54 & 55
